From the President

On behalf of West Australian asthmatics and the Board of Asthma Foundation WA (AFWA) it is my pleasure to thank our many supporters, sponsors and partners.

Your ongoing generous support has enabled the work of Asthma Foundation WA to continue and grow at a time of great economic difficulty.

I never cease to be amazed at the dedication of the people working either as full time, part time or volunteer staff. These people truly believe in the work they are doing and the benefit this work brings to those affected by asthma.

The year of 2015/16 has been tough operationally with the ECU Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma failing to produce the results of the past eleven years. The AFWA staff and AFWA Board have been through an exhaustive review and with a revised plan are confident the ECU Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma will return to its former position as our primary fundraising event.

The Tackling Asthma with the Western Force program produced another outstanding result. This program links first class sport to the asthma cause and is an opportunity for a select number of our corporate supporters to engage with the asthma mission.

The discussion relating to a potential merger of AFWA and other state Asthma Foundations continues. A number of AFWA Board members are involved in workshops examining the potential of a single national asthma organisation. At the time of writing this report we are not in a position to declare final

outcomes as the final two major documents will be delivered in November 2016. Following the receipt of these documents the AFWA Board will need to make a decision relating to a recommendation either to join or remain independent. The discussion on the potential merger has been a distraction to all at AFWA and this has contributed to a less than favourable overall outcome for the year. I must thank the staff for their forbearance.

Last year we spoke of expanding the work of AFWA into regional WA. It is a great pleasure to announce our involvement in the Asthma & COPD Telehealth program. Using teleconferencing technology, we will be able to provide first class education and support by video link to Asthma sufferers and/or carers in regional WA. The program is part of a negotiated contract with the West Australian Country Health Service and the West Australian Primary Health Alliance for the next two years.

It is with regret that I advise the departure of David Johnson from the role of CEO. David has been instrumental in the success of AFWA over the past seven years. We wish him the best in his future career. David will not be lost to AFWA and I am confident we can rely on his solid support in the years ahead.

This year the AFWA Board has been asked to put in more time and effort to help out with national merger workshops and discussions. I thank the Board for their ongoing support in this work.

From the CEO

It is with great pleasure that we present the 52nd Annual Report of the Asthma Foundation WA.

Throughout this report we hope to outline the diverse strategies and programs your Foundation has embarked on during the previous 12 months, which continue to make a difference in the lives of fellow West Australians living with asthma.

Expanding AFWA's Services

During the year we commenced negotiations to expand our services into regional WA. Given the economic climate and pressure on public funding, AFWA formed a new relationship with the West Australian Country Health Services (WACHS) and the West Australian Primary Health Alliance (WAPHA) and adopted their extensive use of video conferencing.





We follow the lead from Diabetes WA who had been using the "Telehealth" technology for the last two years, and after securing funding for the next two years, we began delivering an expanded service in both the Great Southern and Central Wheatbelt regions from September 2016. We look forward to expanding to more regions of WA soon. Congratulations go to our Health Services Team for embracing this initiative and making it a reality.

Financial performance

It is extremely disappointing to report an operating loss this year of \$344,604. AFWA was unable to achieve budget in both Fundraising and Sponsorship. The decision to bring the management of our annual ECU Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma in-house may be viewed by some as an error, due to the loss sustained at the event. However, to many it is viewed as an investment in our future, and gave us complete control of one of our most major assets.

Success in trademarking both the Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma and Tackling Asthma are further examples of controlling our Foundation's future.

The write down in valuation on both the building and investment portfolio has also contributed to the overall negative financial result.

Despite this disappointing outcome, I have received tremendous support from our Finance Manager Sarah McKenna and the Treasurer of AFWA Mr Spencer Broad and I thank them both for their commitment to the Foundation.

Our Partners

We have been blessed to have had the support of one of the world's leading gold producers, Newmont Asia Pacific as our Principal Partner for the last four years. Unfortunately the agreement has ended and the Foundation is seeking a new Principal Partner.

Wesfarmers is one of those proud West Australian organisations that seek no kudos for their tremendous work behind the scenes. The Asthma Foundation WA is proud to be associated with this outstanding group and I thank Alan Carpenter and Jo Williams for their enduring friendship and support.

We welcomed 26 Partners into the Tackling Asthma with the Western Force 2016 initiative and have been overwhelmed with the support shown in the 2016 campaign. 

Department of Health WA

One of the most pleasing outcomes for the year was the signing of a new “Preferred Supplier Agreement” between the Foundation and the Department of Health WA.

This contract ensures our services in WA will continue for the next 3 years, with 2 one year options, dependent on outcomes. With the WACHS Telehealth initiative and support from the WA Primary Health Alliance (WAPHA) added, over \$3 million in support for health services was acquired during the year.

My sincere appreciation to Lynn Wade (WADoH), Jennifer Thompson and Kate Hawkings (WACHS), and Linda Richardson (WAPHA) for driving this outcome, along with the efforts of the AFWA Staff.



Channel 7 Telethon Trust

The Asthma Foundation WA has for many years enjoyed support from the Channel 7 Telethon Trust via grants from Telethon. This year we were very fortunate to receive a grant to develop resources aimed at children, in particular focussing on the management of their asthma.

The Manage My Asthma campaign, involving the Asthma Kids Club featuring 'Puff' the Dragon have resulted via this relationship. We thank Steve Mummery and the Trust for their ongoing commitment to child asthma education.



National

The movement to encourage Asthma Australia to merge with the National Asthma Council and ultimately the creation of a single entity continues to grow momentum. The debate and delay in the development of a business case has caused unnecessary stress on the team and the untimely loss of key staff. A decision will be made by the AFWA Board during November 2016 and a possible vote by members during February 2017 whether we move forward. AFWA partnered in the national website, and since going live in February has delivered national programs with improved results.

Conclusion

I have been very fortunate to report on seven consecutive occasions and during this time witnessed the highs and the lows of managing a not-for-profit entity.

Further challenges will lie ahead as AFWA navigates the financial, strategic and historical issues associated with the possibility of merging to a national single entity and as we face WA's changing economic landscape.

Whilst challenges lie ahead so do opportunities and AFWA looks forward to continuing to reduce the burden of asthma on all West Australians in the coming years.

Research



One of the Foundation's most important roles is to fund research into respiratory health by supporting the next generation of researchers with PhD scholarships and New Investigator grants as well as offering grants to more experienced researchers.

This is overseen by our Medical and Scientific Advisory Committee (MASAC) chaired by Assoc Prof. Graham Hall, who is also a member of our Board and serves as its medical and scientific

advisor. The MASAC committee is comprised of senior medical staff and researchers from Telethon Kids Institute, The University of Western Australia, Murdoch University, Curtin University Institute for Respiratory Health, Fiona Stanley Hospital and Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital.

MASAC is responsible for endorsing the research to be funded by the Foundation. These recommendations are made to the Board following the rigorous peer review.

PROJECT GRANTS

These are traditional project grants aimed primarily at proven researchers in establishing new asthma projects and continuing programs of research. In 2015/2016, the following project grant has been awarded to:

**A pilot study examining the molecular
determinants of postnatal airway
smooth muscle growth**

The thickness of the airway smooth muscle layer is increased in asthma and likely contributes to symptoms such as breathlessness. Emerging data supports the premise that the thickening of the airway smooth muscle layer may have a development origin. Airway development begins early in gestation, in which the smooth muscle lining the upper airways first appears and then develops sequentially to smaller airways.

The volume of the airway smooth muscle layer increases until adulthood, however, the molecular mechanisms producing this growth are not well described. Using a sheep model of airway development, the objective of this study is to determine the molecular mechanisms for growth of the airway smooth muscle.

This study will help reveal molecular targets governing airway growth that may be used for early intervention and prevention to asthma.

NEW INVESTIGATOR GRANTS

The new investigator grants aims to assist asthma researchers at the start of their career to secure their first major element of research funding. In 2015/2016 the following new investigator grants have been awarded to:

Estrogen specific immune modulation in allergic asthma

In early life more boys than girls have asthma, however, this changes following puberty with more women developing asthma than men. This has been linked to levels of the female sex-hormone estrogen and its effect on the immune system. Although this association is well known, we do not know how estrogen directly affects asthma and its related immune responses.

This study will use a pre-clinical asthma model to explore the immunological role of estrogen in allergic asthma. The study will focus on how estrogen affects the function and activation of 1) lung dendritic cells, which sense inhaled allergens and play an important role in inducing asthma flare-ups, and 2) regulatory immune cells in the airways that prevent excessive immune activation and ensuing asthma flare-ups.

Asthma development is, in part, the result of failed immune regulation and, in many cases, an inability of the dendritic cells in the airways to produce an immune response that tolerates every day particles, such as grasses and pollens. Understanding the role of estrogen on the respiratory immune system will potentially lead to new therapies and thus reduce the burden of asthma in affected individuals.

School social experiences of children with asthma: contributions to mental health problem co-morbidity

Children with asthma are at risk of mental health problems including hyperactivity and anxiety, which can impact on their asthma control, overall wellbeing and academic success. To date no research has examined the relationships between asthma control, problems with hyperactivity and anxiety, and the risk of children with asthma being bullied or bullying others.

This research will provide a crucial step toward examining how peer and teacher relationships at school affect behavioural and emotional problems for children with asthma. This study will shed light on how these risks work together in the lives of children with asthma and will provide a strong base for larger studies of how these things work together over time.

With better understanding of these school social experiences, evidence-based holistic school interventions can be developed to promote mental health and improve asthma control, with positive implications for overall health for children with asthma.

Research

THE FIONA STANIFORTH PHD SCHOLARSHIP TOP UP

The Fiona Staniforth Research Awards supports PhD students undertaking postgraduate doctorate degrees who hold or have been approved for a full-time PhD Scholarship to assist in their studies for a maximum of three years. In 2015/2016, the following was awarded to:

Dr Thomas IOSIFIDIS supervised by Associate Professor Sunalene DEVADASON | The University of Western Australia | \$7,500 per annum for one year only

Defective cell migration as a mechanism of dysregulated asthmatic airway repair

VI WATSON VACATION SCHOLARSHIP

Provides students undertaking research projects relevant to asthma. It provides students with the financial support required to continue their research over the summer break.

As well as his role on the MASAC, Prof. James has had a very long association with the Asthma Foundation, attending his first Asthma Camp in 1977 as a junior doctor.


Alan also served as an AFWA Board member for four years, and at our 50th Anniversary in 2014 we acknowledged Alan's long time service by awarding him with life membership.

The Fiona Staniforth Research Awards are given to young researchers as PhD and Honours Scholarships to encourage them into asthma research.

In Memory of Life Member Mr John Kerr OAM

Sadly the Asthma Foundation WA acknowledges the passing of Life Member Mr John Kerr OAM in June 2016.



John first became involved with asthma when his three-year-old daughter suffered a severe asthma attack and the doctor involved was forced to administer adrenaline in order to save her life.

John sought information from the Foundation to aid his daughter manage her condition, and later became a Board Member.

From 1976 to 2012 John held a number of Executive positions on the Board of the Foundation and served as its President twice.



His experience with investments was of great benefit to the Foundation and John provided a lot of knowledge to the Foundation's investment portfolio and subsequent Investment Review Committee.

John was awarded an Order of Australia Medal in 2006 for services to the Asthma Foundation of Western Australia and the Anglican Church.

The Asthma Foundation WA bids farewell to a loyal servant, a Life Member and long term friend of the Foundation.



Health Services

This year the Health Services Team has continued to achieve excellent results in delivering asthma education, information and training to West Australians living with asthma. The proven delivery strategy of educating people with asthma, their carers and the training of health professionals, continues to make a difference in our community.

The Asthma Foundation WA assists people affected by asthma to manage this condition through a range of advocacy and support services to enhance well-being and overall good health.

A major recommendation in the Asthma Model of Care is the universal access to health services across the State. The Foundation has been in negotiations with the West Australian Country Health Service and the WA Primary Health Alliance to investigate the greater use of available technology and is prepared to implement a Telehealth Service during 2016-17. This program will initially be provided to people with asthma in the Wheatbelt and Great Southern Regions, with a view to expand across WA in the following years.

A large effort has been made to ensure quality resources and best practice is demonstrated in all our services. Our education and training services are subject to continual review and a system of continuous improvement is ongoing.



Asthma educators at the Foundation continue to provide education in various locations throughout the metropolitan area whilst maintaining a centralised office in West Perth. Locations that are regularly serviced by our educators include: Mandurah, Rockingham, Armadale, Kalamunda, Morley, Joondalup, Darch and Fremantle.

The Foundation is an active participant in the WA Department of Health Respiratory Health Network which exists to provide a consumer and primary healthcare perspective in policy development and planning for health service delivery.

Asthma Foundation WA and the Minister for Health have entered into a five year Service Agreement in relation to the new Perth Children's Hospital. This agreement will allow asthma educators to provide one on one education on the wards to carers of people with asthma and hospital staff.



Health Services

Community Education

The Community Services Program is funded by the WA Department of Health (WADoH) to provide consumer information, education and advocacy on behalf of people with asthma.

Service delivery focussed on high-risk and priority populations including parents of children less than nine years of age, Aboriginal populations and people from rural and remote areas of Western Australia.



This year the Foundation has been in negotiations with the WADoH to continue this funded program past 2015/16. A new contract has been signed that ensures funding for the next three years, with the option of two one-year extensions culminating in the Foundation becoming a Preferred Service Provider to the WADoH.

The Community Education Program has been conducted throughout the community with education and information delivered to 3,182 individuals.



The Health Services Team has engaged health professionals to ensure that the Foundation's services are a part of the referral pathway for people with asthma. Increased numbers of health professionals are utilising this pathway model to refer their patients to our individualised education sessions. These sessions aim to increase knowledge and confidence in managing asthma in partnership with their health professional.

The Asthma Foundation WA has a Freecall Information Line to provide support to people with asthma throughout Western Australia, in 1800 ASTHMA. This is manned by experienced Asthma Educators who supply detailed help to people throughout the year.

Asthma Australia has launched a new initiative called COACH intended to standardise the response to requests for Asthma Education made through the Freecall Information Line across Australia. The Foundation has been an active participant in this process as it will allow for the continuation of quality service in years to come.

Manage My Asthma - supported by Telethon

The Manage My Asthma project promoted asthma management to children with asthma and their carers. The campaign's mascot 'Puff' the Dragon led the charge, appearing around Perth and recruiting new members to join his Kid's Club that will teach healthy habits to kids with asthma.



Thank you to Channel 7 Telethon Trust for their support of Manage My Asthma; it is an honour to work with Telethon to improve the health of children in WA.

Health Services

Professional Training

Seminars and workshops were conducted for Health Professionals to enable them to take current asthma information to their workplaces and into the wider community. The centrepiece of our Health Professional training is the Foundations' Asthma Educators Course. The strategy for this course is to train Health Professionals as Asthma Educators to further extend the care and help provided by the Foundation.

National Programs

As a proud member of Asthma Australia, AFWA participates in the Asthma Child and Adolescent Program (ACAP) and the Community Support Program (CSP). Asthma Australia is funded by the Department of Health and Aging to manage these programs. ACAP now targets the whole school community to include education sessions for parents and students as well as teachers and support staff.

The year saw 3,547 teachers and support staff from 207 schools educated via face to face delivery on how to manage asthma emergencies in a school settings. 1,197 students and 219 parents participated in education sessions. Of the 207 schools which trained in the program, 132 have become Asthma Friendly, taking the overall tally to 302 schools registered as Asthma Friendly in WA. Further education was provided to schools via online delivery with 875 school staff completing the training from 147 schools.

The Community Support Program targets people with asthma and their family and carers in at-risk populations including seniors, Aboriginal people, culturally and linguistically diverse people, people from low socio-economic areas, and regional and rural West Australians.

The aim of the program is to;

- increase access to asthma information and education
- increase the target groups' ability to effectively manage their asthma
- provide referral pathways and access to relevant support services

During this financial year 95 group education sessions were delivered to health professionals, aged care facilities and seniors. The Foundation Health Services Team is commended on their professionalism and diligence in working toward our vision to free West Australians from the burden of asthma.

Carers Training

Training courses were conducted for people who had a duty of care to people with asthma to enable them to take current asthma information to their workplaces and into the wider community. The bulk of our training is delivered to Early Childhood Educators via the Emergency Asthma Management Course. 202 people were trained in Emergency Asthma First Aid in this financial year.



Business Development Overview


The Fundraising and Business Development team saw a lot of challenges in 2015/16, as have many given the local economic climate, but the importance of supporting the Foundation rang true to partners and donors and their contributions provided critical funds. The ECU Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma celebrated its 12th year on Perth's freeways, 26 companies joined our Tackling Asthma with the Western Force campaign, and donations to our fundraising appeals remained quite strong.

Partnerships

The Foundation would not be where it is today without the support of our corporate partners and we are deeply appreciative to all who support us and our mission. Special gratitude to Newmont Asia Pacific for their continued keystone support as Principal Partner for the fourth year. Our Major Partners, Wesfarmers, Bupa and Toyota WA also showed outstanding commitment. We are thrilled to welcome this year's new partners Abbott & Co, Aussie Natural Spring Water, Edith Cowan University (ECU) and Mellen Events.

Tackling Asthma with the Western Force raised a fantastic \$87,154 in 2016 for asthma. 26 generous companies take part in the campaign and donate \$2 for every tackle made by a Western Force player during the season. This year we welcomed ten new partners: 50Hz Solutions, Abbott & Co, AGI, Aussie Natural Spring Water, Cambridge Insurance, Custom Cars & Coffee WA, DFG Legal, Glacier Pools, Rockcliffe Wines and Stirling Partners. Returning partners Bupa, PrintSync, and ABS Marketing took it to the next level by fundraising and donating above and beyond. Thank you to all our fantastic partners who helped us 'tackle asthma'!

The 2016 ECU Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma was back again for a great day of cycling and fundraising for the 12th consecutive year. In 2016, we welcomed Edith Cowen University as the Event Naming Rights partner, with additional major support from Bupa, Midland Brick, Cycliq, Perth Airport, Aussie Natural Spring Water, and Mellen Events. Cheers to all for helping make it a great event.





Fundraising



Thank you to our loyal donors and fundraisers who provide steadfast and critical support for the Foundation. In 2015/16, over \$220,000 was donated by our generous community of individual and group supporters.

The 2016 ECU Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma took place on 4th April 2016 with 3,500 riders participating. This was fewer than in previous years, however the ride was a brilliant day, very well run, and we aim to grow the event again in 2017.

Over 600 riders fundraised and donated for asthma, raising over \$80,000 for asthma support services and research. We would like to especially recognise the highest individual and group fundraisers: Rick Adair and the Coglioni Cycling Club (who over the past 4 years have raised over \$60,000 for the Fiona Staniforth Research Fund).

Thank you to all of the dedicated individuals and teams who helped support the asthma cause.

Members of the community have also selflessly and creatively fundraised year round for the Foundation in their schools, workplaces, and communities.

Notably, the "Friends of Fallon" have held numerous events to raise donations for asthma in loving memory of Fallon Munday. We applaud all our asthma champions who are raising awareness and helping save lives.

THE 2016 Tackling Asthma campaign, in partnership with the Western Force, has raised more than \$83,000 for the Asthma Foundation Western Australia.

The campaign is the largest yearly fundraising effort for the foundation.



Surgery for asthma hailed as 'revolution'

A radical approach that involves applying a heated tube inside the airways of asthmatics is being hailed as a revolution in treatment.

Research being presented today at a respiratory medicine conference in Perth reduces excessive smooth muscle and widens the air passages, cutting the chances of an asthma attack.

Results of the first Australian trial showed a 50 per cent reduction in asthma symptoms.

Though the procedure was still relatively uncommon in Australia, the approach appeared to be completely revolutionary.

An estimated 2.3 million Australians have asthma, with 5 and 10 per cent of children and young people respectively.

With an eye on funding sustainability and creating value for Asthma Foundations I am pleased to report that our small national secretariat continues to add considerable value for member Asthma Foundations. A review of the 2015 AIM High Best Practice data clearly shows great improvements in funding diversity and sustainability, brand awareness and reputation, consumer awareness, digital engagement and employee engagement and satisfaction.

The efforts of the Asthma Australia team in building relationships with stakeholders within the lung health community, corporate partners and across all levels of government is a highlight. Our relationship with the National Asthma Council Australia has never been stronger and our joint advocacy efforts are ensuring that people with asthma and their treating health professionals have a strong and highly regarded voice in the nation's capital. The continuing collaboration on the development of a National Asthma Strategy, to guide future decision making, investment and programs, is a testimony of the strong partnership between our two peak bodies.

It is very pleasing that we have retained all of our traditional corporate partners and major donors whilst we also welcomed several new corporate supporters. In a milestone we have invested a record amount in asthma

research and several of the projects have attracted significant international attention. The clinical and population health projects to support people with severe asthma have been particularly successful in that regard.

In November 2015 all State and Territory Asthma Foundations and the National Asthma Council Australia (our sister peak body), supported by Asthma Australia signed a historic Memorandum of Understanding to work towards merging the two national and eight state and territory asthma organisations into one new 21st century asthma charity. The history of all the participating organisations is rich and all have outstanding legacies but most if not all agree that the current federated structure is not best serving people with asthma and the health professionals that treat them.

In this regard I am confident that the new national asthma charity will celebrate and embrace past success bring about long awaited reform that can only benefit people with asthma and their treating health professionals.

Financial Report 2015/2016

Asthma Foundation of WA Inc

Treasurer Statement



During my fourth year as Treasurer the Foundation witnessed a tough financial year. The Foundation reported an operating deficit of \$344,604 for the year ended June 30th 2016.

The deficit is largely due to the new initiative to manage the ECU Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma in-house. Registration and fundraising income for the event did not meet targets and the event resulted in a loss. A full evaluation of the event has been held and the plans are in place to return the ECU Freeway Bike Hike for Asthma and the Foundation to surplus in 2016/17.

The Australian Stock Exchange showed a decline in 2015/16 and the value of Foundation's investment portfolio has reduced accordingly. The Foundation follows a long term investment strategy under the guidance of its Investment Review Committee and the portfolio is expected to recover with the market.

After non-operational items of -\$3,008 being accounted for, the total deficit for the year was \$347,612. This is a marked decrease from the 2014/15 surplus of \$27,194.

A sworn valuation is held on Foundation property every three years to ensure currency. In June 2016 a new valuation was solicited, and the value of AFWA's property has been reduced as per current market values.

In 2015/16 the Foundation's Balance Sheet has reduced from \$5,022,897 to \$4,328,756. Despite this decrease the Foundation remains in good financial health, with stable long term assets and a strong investment portfolio. The reduced value of investments and property is a reflection of general trends in Western Australia.

During my tenure the Asthma Foundation WA has recorded a series of recurring surpluses. Despite setbacks in 2015/16 the Foundation is set to improve its position financially and is budgeting to return to surplus in 2016/17.





For the 12 month period ended 30 June 2016****1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

Asthma Foundation of WA Inc. (The Foundation) is a not-for-profit association incorporated and domiciled in Western Australia.

The functional and presentation currency of the foundation is Australian Dollars.

These financial statements were authorised for issue on 20 September 2016.

Basis of Preparation

In management's opinion, the foundation is not a reporting entity, since there are unlikely to be users of the financial report who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act 2015.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations.

These financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period, unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

Income Tax

The Foundation is exempt from income tax.

Investments

Investments are brought to account at market value at balance date.

Dividends, Interest Trust and Partnership distributions are brought to account on an accrual basis.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Property

Property is included as per Sworn Valuation 30 June 2016.

Revenue

Donations are recognised at the time of receipt.

Grants and subsidies are recognised as income over the period to which they relate

Other Revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Income from Bequests is recorded as Non Operational Income.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciation amount of all plant and equipment is depreciated over useful lives of the assets to the Foundation commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for the liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST.
